Lance-leaf Coreopsis

Coreopsis lanceolata

Light: Full Sun

Soil: Sand, Loam

Moisture: Dry, Medium

Benefits: Pollinators, Butterflies, Deer Resistant

Height: 1'-2'

Blooms: Jun, Jul

Zones: 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9

Color: Yellow

Spacing: 1'

Root: Short Rhizomes

Lance-leaf Coreopsis thrives in poor, sandy or rocky soils with good drainage. Flowers bloom in spring to early summer, and deadheading encourages additional blooms. The plants are best naturalized in native wildflower gardens and meadows and work well in cultivated gardens and borders when self-seeding tendencies are kept in check.

Coreopsis are sometimes called lanceleaf tickseed because the shape of the seed resembles a tick. The plants are attractive to bees, butterflies, pollinators and songbirds.
