

Bush's Poppy Mallow

Bush's Poppy Mallow's claim to fame is the lovely, deep magenta flowers that inspire its other common name, wine cups. It can get as tall as 2 feet in height but also spreads outward. It prefers drier soil conditions, well-drained soil, and full sun to partial shade, which makes it a good choice for many Keweenaw gardens. And while Bush's Poppy Mallow has a peak bloom in early summer, it also throws flowers periodically until fall. The plant provides good ground cover in dry areas and can trail over a stone wall.
