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## Wild Petunia

Ruellia humilis

Light: Full sun

Soil: Loam, Sand

Moisture: Dry, Medium

Benefits: Birds, Hummingbirds, Pollinators, Deer Resistant

Height: 1' to 2'

Blooms: June, July, August

Zones: 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9

Color: Lavender

Spacing: 1'

Root: Taproot

This rare sweetie plant is native to downstate Michigan, location of the state's last remnant prairies. Its charming, fluted flowers appear in midsummer in our area and bloom intermittently until fall.

A good plant for the front of the border, it sometimes takes awhile to emerge, so be patient. It's a good companion for other low-growing plants. While wild petunia can hold its own against aggressors, it is not especially pushy. It's great in rock gardens but also does quite well in loamy conditions.

Ruellia humilis is a host plant for caterpillars of the Common Buckeye butterfly (Junonia coenia) and the White Peacock (Anartia jatrophae) butterfly.
